At the end of 2018 we had 155 paid up household memberships. 40 members paid by Bank Transfer and the remainder by cheque or cash. In addition, our donation box generated just over £500 in 2018. Much of this came from donations for bags of apples picked from our orchard.

July: The lovely grapevine in the Old Allotment was so prolific because of the fabulous summer heatwave, that the supports holding it up collapsed under the weight of the fruit! This created an ongoing construction job for our Chairman who has designed and made a superb new structure to accommodate the, now drastically pruned, vine! This will quickly grow back again. At least the grapes were not wasted as a local winemaker asked if she could harvest them and we collected bucket loads for her to take away.

We made a start on clearing an area in front of the bird hide for a new 'insect hotel'.

The regular grass and hedge cutting continues......

August: Steve persevered with working on the 'pergola'. Volunteers cleared the bank in the entranceway of nettles and brambles and the bank alongside the 'Bog': an ongoing task. Reserve Manager, Howard, continued to treat the water in the Mere with barley straw extract.

September: The apple crop was exceptionally good this year so some of the work party time was taken up with fruit picking. The apples were bagged up and put out at the entrance, by the donation box, with a request for £1 a bag. This generated an income of over £200. Not bad for a few mornings work!

Sadly, our best quince tree blew over in a storm and had to be removed. We managed to salvage the fruit

and turn it into Quince Jelly. As mentioned earlier, this will available at our monthly work parties.

Neil and Mike cut various hedges around the site.

October: Volunteers picked the Quince from the trees in the entrance area. These trees haven't fared well in recent years but they obviously liked the long hot summer we all enjoyed last year. Committee members helped pick grapes with the wine-making lady. The last of the Howgate Wonder apples were picked and put out for sale at the gate.

The insect hotel was finally completed!

November: We concentrated this month on clearing the very overgrown bank in the Orchard, and generally tidying up that whole area. This involved vigorously pruning back the buddleias, freeing a large holly bush of brambles and pulling up the ever tenacious nettles!

Volunteers also started to clear an area inside the Pyghtle in readiness for planting a new Damson tree. The original one on the Reserve is no longer usefully productive so will be removed as part of a programmed schedule of tree work planned to be done before the spring.



December: Roger B has done a fantastic job of revamping the herb garden by the entrance gate and he gave it some further TLC in December. It is looking good and nearly all the newly planted herbs survived last year's hot summer. Apparently, there were only a few losses.

January: At the first Wednesday work party this year volunteers continued digging out unwanted Dogwood around the site. Had we realised 27 years ago how vigorous it is we would not have planted any in the first instance! The other main task was to have a bonfire to get rid of the, increasingly growing, piles of cut brambles and prunings from around the site. The morning ended with our helpers enjoying some delicious lemon cake, mulled wine, Stollen and coffee. Very nice.

Sunday 27th **January:** Hedgelaying, pollarding, digging over an area in the Pyghtle in readiness for planting a new Damson tree. Prune fruit trees

Sunday 24th **February:** Treating the sheds and bird hide with wood preservative, weather permitting. General maintenance. Hedgelaying. Clear pond of excessive vegetation.

Sunday 31st March: Thinning out Flag Iris and Bulrushes in backwater alongside the Allotment. General maintenance

Sunday 28th April: General maintenance

Sunday 26th May: Maintain paths, trim hedges, general maintenance.

Sunday 30th June: Cutting grasslands and meadows and remove arisings.

ONGOING TASKS FROM THE MANAGEMENT PLAN

- Removal of Flag Iris in the Mere where it is becoming too dominant.
- Clearing The Bog of invasive and weedy species by 25% each year and keeping the Willows under control. These are difficult jobs that keep being overlooked so we need to have a concerted effort this year!
- Maintaining fences, paths, bridges and seats to a good condition.

The **monthly work party** is always held on the last Sunday of the month. All ages are welcome. Work parties start at **10am** and finish around **1pm**. Light refreshments are served around midday. Tools and gloves are provided.

The work parties are a great way to get to meet new people. Come and give us a try!

The regular, weekly Wednesday morning work party starts at **10am** and lasts for a couple of hours. If you are interested in coming along it is a good idea to give Janet W, our Secretary, your contact details as she sends out an e-mail in advance of the work party to let you know what is planned that week. Also, she can let you know if it is cancelled for any reason.





2018 - A Bumper Year for Butterflies


Following 2017s rather wet and cold summer, in 2018 we experienced the hottest May for several years and this fine weather continued for much of the summer, creating excellent conditions for butterflies.

Our intrepid and loyal recorders, Alison, Derryn and Julie, completed 50 visits to the Reserve this summer between the start of April and the end of September during which they counted 1020 butterflies. The average number seen per visit was over 20 compared with 5 in the previous 2 years. Not only were there more butterflies but many species emerged earlier than usual and were often able to have a second brood which meant they were visible over a longer period.

The graphs show what and when, and then the second set compares with previous years.









The biggest increases were seen in the Whites particularly the Small White and Large White. To the relief of vegetable gardeners the previous two years had been poor, possibly also reducing the numbers of predators that depend on these butterflies, so this year in favourable conditions, their numbers boomed. Also doing well both on the Reserve and nationally were the Holly Blue. However, whilst the Common Blue did well nationally, we did not manage any sightings. We have planted Bird's-foot Trefoil, their favourite food plant, which had now become established so hopefully it's not too long before we see some Common Blue butterflies fluttering around. The Red Admiral and Ringlet did less well this year both on the Reserve and nationally. Also not recorded at all were Marbled White and Painted Lady butterflies. This year we recorded 18 different species and now have reached 20 different species recorded since we started surveying. This rising trend for the Reserve suggests we must be doing something right! Particularly exciting was confirmation of a new species for the Reserve - the spectacular Silver-washed Fritillary.
